

Message from the President



Over the last decade. ISHK has taken advantage of Internet technology allowing us to offer more extensive information about what it means to be human. As a consequence, many of our programs have reached a new level. We can now offer a more complete view of humanity, from our distant ancestors, our biological and social evolution, to the education of our children, promoting works both for the general public and for advanced professionals.

The aim: To link our deep past to a future where humanity can unite around a common higher perspective. It's what we've been working toward for the 45 years of the Institute.

Since 1969, we've sold books on these subjects, including the important works of Idries Shah, over 900,000 works by others, and more than 4.5 million children's books. We've organized symposia, which have had attendance of a few hundred thousand, and a continuing education program that has allowed psychologists and physicians to take 37,000 courses.

Now, in this new exciting phase, we're seeking to make ISHK's work available online to anyone at any time; not only to a professional psychologist, but to a student in China; not only to a parent who buys a book, but to a curious young girl in rural India. Anywhere there's a connection.

Once again, we could not have accomplished our work without the help of The Will J. Reid Foundation who has supported ISHK for more than a dozen years, as well as the help of many generous donors and extraordinary volunteers around the country and the world -- all who aim to maintain the mission of ISHK to allow us all to change, adapt and care for ourselves and the planet on which we all live.

Key 2015 Accomplishments

Thanks once more to the generous support of The Will J. Reid Foundation (WJRF) since 2002, and to the generous donations and volunteer services from so many individuals, we were able to achieve significant advances in 2015.

HOOPOE BOOKS: Hoopoe's beautiful new mobile/ Google-friendly website which is much easier to navigate and works well on all kinds of devices, now includes two new Hoopoe paperback titles: *The Stranger's Farewell* and *The Wisdom of Ahmad Shah* by the Afghan teacher and storyteller Palwasha Bazger Salam.

SHARE LITERACY: We continued our program through strategic book and teacher materials placement in more than over 60 programs around the USA, as well as in Canada and Mexico.

BOOKS FOR AFGHANISTAN: Thanks to the help and generosity of our supporters, we have now distributed over 4 million Hoopoe books in Dari-Pashto and English since January 2007 when we began our program. In 2015, 212,000 Hoopoe Books were distributed by our partners to NGOs inside Afghanistan, among them are: the Aga Khan Foundation, Zeyar Civil Society, the Afghan Volunteer Women's Association, Lamia Afghan Foundation, the Afghan Mobile Mini Children's Circus, and the British Council.

BOOKS FOR PAKISTAN: Since this program began in 2011 we have printed **70,000 English-Urdu and Urdu-Pashto editions** of Hoopoe books which are now being distributed. Ten of our titles have been translated and prepared for press in Urdu-Sindh and Urdu-Balochi editions. Early in 2016, we plan to launch a new website: www.booksforpakistan.org. **eBOOKS NEWS:** In addition to developing Hoopoe Books for Amazon Kindle and Apple iBooks which will be launched in 2016, we continued to make most of our Malor Books available on Kindle. The **Idries Shah Foundation** (**ISF**) will continue making all of Shah's work available in various print and ebook formats.

CE@HOME: This year, we've added more titles and new categories on mindfulness, empathy, attachment theory, and psychodynamic psychotherapy.

CME FOR PHYSICIANS: We began this program in 2012 in partnership with the Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center and now include 15 courses available online from our Website.

THE HUMAN JOURNEY: This year we focused on in the Fourth Section of the website - **The Road to the Future**. To this section we added (1) an introduction to Intercultural Understanding and Empathy, followed by reports on two major works; (2) a comprehensive review of international aid; (3) reviews of important works on modern economy, education, and sustainable energy; and (4) an analysis of Health contributed by David S. Sobel, MD, MPH.

ISHK ADMINISTRATION: The ISHK Book Service is now closed. All titles from both ISHK imprints: Hoopoe Books and Malor Books, are now available directly through Amazon.com and Ingram. As mentioned last year, the Idries Shah Foundation (ISF) has closed the Octagon Press and is currently publishing new editions of Shah's titles as softcover books, audio books and eBooks.

New Hoopoe Titles

This year, we introduced two new Hoopoe titles: *The Stranger's Farewell* illustrated by Marie LaFrance and *The Legend Of Ahmad Shah* illustrated by Natasha Delmar. Both titles are retellings of traditional tales from the Middle East and Central Asia, written by the Afghan storyteller and teacher Palwasha Bazger Salam.

Earlier in the year, thanks to translator Rita Wirkala, we published two new bilingual Spanish-English editions for *Fatima the Spinner and the Tent* and *The Magic Horse*. Now, all 11 of the Shah children's stories are available in Spanish-English bilingual editions.

Hoopoe Website:

This year Leslie Morgan designed and developed a new Hoopoe website **www.hoopoekids.com** that enables retail and trade customers to purchase our books by linking directly to Amazon.com and Ingram.com. We published new revised editions of the eleven Hoopoe children's Teaching-Stories by Idries Shah. They now include information on free resources for parents and teachers which can be downloaded from the website to help children retell the stories to their friends and family.

A New Book on Spirituality

God 4.0



In preparation for 7 years, this book is now in drafting phase. The theme:

• For the last 600 years, scientific advances have encroached upon the sphere of spirituality. Human beings once were special - thought once to be at the center of the Universe - and all revolved around us. It's been a continuous progression, reducing our role, from Copernicus' demonstration that the Earth isn't the center of the Universe, to the knowledge that objects move on their own according to physical laws, to Darwin's connecting human life to the rest of Nature, to Freud, to modern psychology and neuroscience on the determinants of thought and behavior. This loss of specialness initiated a loss of faith which coexisted with the rise of a scientific understanding of life and brings the two into conflict.

• However, in the past few decades, new developments, especially in psychology and neuroscience, and new studies of ancient texts have allowed a new view, shorn of both inflated metaphors and scientific reduction. Human beings are evolved to go beyond the individual, to connect in a way that no other organism can, and this is the basis of our success.

• This understanding - that we're innately capable of an overarching view of the connectedness of life - has a definable neuropsychology. It is not the captive of a religion or a sect, and is not, as many science writers have thought, a by-product, an illusion or even a delusion of our creative brain. It is a natural, primary and foundational component of humanity, no matter how much comfort the skeptic takes in reductive unbelief or the religious adherent finds in the solace given for a loss.

Since we started Share Literacy in 2000, we've distributed over 666,900 Hoopoe books to schools, youth programs, homeless shelters, hospitals & clinics, and community service centers, etc. Many organizations, some of which are listed on the next page, depend on our help every year to brighten up the lives of the children they serve. Educators around the country continue to use our excellent standards-aligned teacher lesson plans available as free downloads on the Hoopoekids.com site.

For the last 14 years, with the help of donors and volunteers we have given Hoopoe books in English and Spanish-English bilingual editions as holiday gifts for young children in shelters and in schools serving at-risk children throughout the country. This holiday season, with the help of volunteer Share Chapters in California, Washington D.C., and Massachusetts, we distributed **15,294 books and 1,400 audio CDs** with some of the books in **1450 Home Literacy Kits** donated to the youngest readers. Each kit contained a Hoopoe story by Idries Shah, an audio version of the story, and a *Read Together* Newsletter giving tips and advice to parents on reading regularly with their children. And thanks to our partners in Canada, ICE (**www.iceeducation.org**), Share has also provided books to children in Canada and Mexico.

Washington DC Chapter – A special printing of 6000 books for the Holiday Book drive were delivered late in December (due to a delay at U.S. Customs), and the Chapter was able to distribute 3,796 books in Virginia, Maryland, and DC and will deliver the remainder later in 2016. Additionally, in 2015 the Chapter distributed 582 books to programs in Maryland and New York and were able to sell books in the annual Alternative Gift Fair in Takoma Park, MD.





Books for Afghanistan - www.booksforafghanistan.org



This project was conceived back in 2005 and implemented in 2007 as a way to 'repatriate' the Hoopoe stories collected by Idries Shah, providing them in book form for the children of Afghanistan as an aid to literacy.

Thanks to the generosity of our supporters, we have now distributed over 4 million Hoopoe books in Dari-Pashto and English since January 2007 when we first obtained the Afghan Ministry of Education (MOE) approval to provide these books and began our program.

In spite of increased security issues, and the disruption of electrical power by Taliban insurgents, our intrepid partners, **Khatiz Organization for Rehabilitation**, printed another 83,500 books this year, and distributed another 212,000 books to NGOs helping

children, among them are: the Aga Khan Foundation, Zeyar Civil Society, the Afghan Volunteer Women's Association, Lamia Afghan Foundation, the Afghan Mobile Mini Children's Circus, and the British Council.



Books for Pakistan - www.booksforpakistan.org

Since this program began in 2011, we have printed a total of **70,000 English-Urdu and Urdu-Pashto editions** of Hoopoe children's Teaching-Stories written especially for children by Idries Shah. These are currently being distributed nationwide.

With the help of the NGOs Alif Laila Book Bus Society, HOPE, BRAC and Khwendo Kor we were able to provide 9,200 books to children in the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KPK), many of whom were forced to leave their homes and now reside in refugee in Peshawar and elsewhere.

Although Pakistan's national language is Urdu and their official language English, the majority of children's primary languages are different. Recent studies recommend that children learn to read in




their native tongue and to accommodate this Hoopoe this year translated and prepared ten of our titles in Urdu-Sindh and Urdu-Balochi editions. We hope to raise the funds to print and distribute these in 2016 along with additional copies of the two editions now in print.




In August, **the Alif Laila Book Bus Society** in collaboration with the PHA Foundation and Hoopoe Books launched the **StoryWalk Project** in six of Lahore's parks. A total of fifteen children's books published by Hoopoe Books and Alif Laila were displayed on large flexes in these parks for children and their families to read and enjoy.




For decades, this program under the leadership of Charles Swencionis, Ph.D., has provided information in areas that ISHK is concerned about to thousands of professional psychologists, to help these ideas filter into the mainstream. We introduced over 18 new courses in 2015 and new categories for mindfulness, empathy, attachment theory, and psychodynamic psychotherapy. New works include Paul Ekman's *Moving Toward Global Compassion*, Rick Hanson and Richard Mendius' *Buddha's Brain*, Yvette Harris and James A. Graham's *The African Amercian Child*. In 2016, we will develop more courses on ethics, borderline personality disorder, spirituality and higher consciousness.

Ratings for this program are very high, as confirmed by the APA, and it serves to educate professionals on new ideas about human nature. Our quarterly email mailings are proving to be successful in alerting more and more psychologists to our program, and to keep them up to date on our offerings.

Thanks to the hard work of Margaret Caudill Slosberg, M.D., and to Rob Mancinelli for his web-development skills, this program further broadens the base of information, in this case, relating to physician practice. Offerings through our affiliate, Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center and Dartmouth Medical School continue to bring interest to our program.

This year we focused on "Creating a Sustainable Future" in the Fourth Section of the website - **The Road to the Future**. This section includes an introduction to Intercultural Understanding and Empathy followed by reports on two major works: *Thinking Big: How the Evolution of Social Life Shaped the Human Mind* by Robin Dunbar and *Social: Why Our Brains Are Wired to Connect* by Matthew D. Lieberman. We have started a section on **Education**, including reports on two important works: *One World Schoolhouse: Education Reimagined* by Salman Khan and *Improbable Scholars: The Rebirth of a Great American School System* by the nationally known education expert David L. Kirp. We also completed a comprehensive review of **International Aid**, its history, its effectiveness: what works and what doesn't; and have added a section on the analysis of **Health** contributed by David S. Sobel, MD, MPH.

Titles are added to the book collection in each section's "Bookstore" which can be purchased through links on the website. In addition, each section has a "NEWS" feature, with links to articles published since the site was last updated to ensure that visitors are able to keep up-to-date on the topics discussed.

In 2016, we will continue updating the site as we have this year. We plan to complete the overview of Education and to begin to look at the Arab legacy of science and philosophy and its influence on the European history.





ISHK's Malor Books imprint was launched in 1995 to keep seminal works in print that would otherwise not be available. Malor Books publications are used in hundreds of university courses around the world.

In order to ensure that the information contained in these definitive titles remains available for future generations, Malor Books continued making works available through online stores. Amazon's Kindle, Google Books, and other eBooks sites now have many of the Malor Books in digital editions available for purchase. Libraries are able to purchase books through online distributors, such as Ingram and Folletts.

By early 2016, all Malor Books will be available directly through Ingram.com and Amazon.com, and next year we'll continue to make more titles available in eBook editions.



ISHK Administration Changes
